
BOOKCLUB

long with many other literacy projects at Eden Boys, some of the Year 7 students have joined a brunchtime book club. The students chose to read 'The Boy who Made the World Disappear' by Ben Miller, which is a clever adventure story that mixes real science and observations of life. This book is very accessible in terms of design and ideas and has allowed the students to develop comprehension and evaluation.

The book club meet once a week to read together (along with biscuits and drinks!) and enjoy talking about each chapter as we read. Literacy is essential to learning across every subject in secondary school and a firm predictor of outcomes in a student's later life. Research suggests that reading enjoyment is more important to children's educational success than their family's socio-economic status (OECD). Reading develops cultural capital, which enables young people to understand and empathise with others and events outside of their own experiences. Confident, ambitious reading cultivates leadership skills.

There are many more exciting literacy projects and events coming to Eden Boys Birmingham, very soon - we are going big on books! Watch this space.
