BLACK HISTORY MONTH OCTOBER 2023



uring the month of October, Eden Boys' School celebrated the rich cultural diversity of our community by commemorating Black History Month. We firmly believe that black and ethnic history is part of the history of the world and should not be relegated to a single month, however during this month we make a special effort to look at the contributions of black and ethnic minorities and their positive influence on British society.

This year's theme for Black History Month was saluting our sisters. Students in History lessons and form time learnt about the contributions of black pioneers such as Mary Seacole, Diane Abbott, and Yvonne Conolly who was the UK's first black headteacher. She was also part of the Windrush generation from Jamaica who arrived in Britain during the 1950s and 60s and faced many racial hardships. Black women have been at the heart of social justice movements throughout history, courageously battling oppression and advocating for change. However, their accomplishments have frequently been neglected or forgotten. The theme of saluting our sisters emphasises the vital role black women have played in shaping history, inspiring change, and building communities.

We also looked at Black influences in our society in lessons such as PSHE, we looked at the Windrush migration and the impact of the Black Lives Matters movement in recent times. Furthermore, to promote Black and Ethnic culture, the canteen served up a fantastic treat of West Indian jerk chicken with rice and peas as part of the school menu for all staff and students to enjoy.

We will continue to celebrate the diversity of our community for many years to come!

OXFORD UNIVERSITY: A VISIT TO REMEMBER

On Friday 20th October, our Year 10's had the privilege of visiting the world's most prestigious academic institution, the University of Oxford. The University of Oxford was ranked worlds No. 1 in 2023. Oxford is a unique and historic institution where thirty British Prime Ministers have been educated.


This was Eden Boys' 4th visit to the University of Oxford campus Keble College. Keble College has come a long way since its opening in 1870. The first Oxford College of the modern era, it was founded in memory of John Keble (1792-1866), well known for his best-selling Christian verse and a key member of the so-called 'Oxford' movement.

University of Oxfords Access and outreach officer organised an inspiring day for our pupils. Year 10's had an insight into Keble College and were informed about the importance of attaining high grades at GCSE and A level to secure a place at the University.

Student ambassadors studying at the University provided tours around the student union, library and the great 'Hogwarts' style dining hall. The University provided complimentary lunch to all the pupils.

Our students also visited the world renown Natural History Museum of Oxford established in 1860. The museum housed life like dinosaur fossils, birds and other animal specimens. One of the highlights was the world's first scientifically described dinosaur – Megalosaurus bucklandii – and the world-famous Oxford Dodo, the only soft tissue remains of the extinct dodo.







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TURKISH EXCHANGE TRIP



In November, 31 students from Eden Boys' Birmingham and Eden Boys' Leadership Academy went on an exchange trip to Turkey, Istanbul in partnership with Maltepe Orhangazi, a Turkish boarding school.

DAY 1

After arriving to the Orhangazi school, students were shown their dormitory rooms where they would be staying for the remainder of the trip. Students then prayed Esha and headed to bed for an early morning. We awoke at Fajr time, at 7.00am to pray in congregation at the in-school prayer room and indulged in the breakfast all provided by the Turkish hosts.

Our first visit was the the Princes Islands via Port Marina. We spent 3 hours enjoying the tour of the island and the beautiful scenery. The island had picturesque architectural buildings, shops, monastery, and parks. In Buyukada, we walked past the lovely wooden mansions which are fascinating examples of the island's late Ottoman-era architecture.

We were treated to fine dining at The Acyudiz restaurant, being served chicken soup, rice and a meat dish. Students then headed to the Viaport Marina, housing the ViaSea aquarium a theme park and shopping mall. The aquarium/sea life centre was filled with a vast array of reptiles, fishes, insects and other wildlife.

After the mall we were invited to an in-school event hosted by Orhangazi at the Kubbealti Hall. Parents of the Turkish partners and other special guests delivered a warm welcome speech, followed by ice breaker activities and a hearty dinner.

DAY 2

t 5.30am we headed to Mimar Sinan mosque to pray Fajr, After morning prayers we headed to Emirgan Park. The Emirgan Park (Emirgan Grove or Woods) is situated in the pretty Emirgan neighborhood by the Bosphorus shores and covers an area of 325,000 square meters. We then enjoyed a hearty breakfast prepared by the parents of Orhangazi pupils. Consisting of fresh Turkish bread, traditional Turkish soup, eggs, salad, pastries and a variety of sides. Our next stop was the Yeni Cami (New Mosque), in Eminounu. semi-domes. Later in the day students were paired with their Turkish au pair and sent to the Spice Bazaar to do some haggling and shopping. After heading back to the dormitory a football match between our host, OrhanGazi and ourselves was arranged. Teachers, Principals and parents were all invited to watch the exhilarating football match. Our host school defeated Eden Boys', with a 4:1 victory.



DAY 3

arly in the morning, after prayers, we embarked on a coach ride to Riva, a village in the north of Istanbul known for being the location of the Turkish TV series hits "Dirilis: Ertuğrul" and its sequel "Kurulus: Osman." There, we enjoyed a traditional Turkish breakfast and were pleasantly surprised by a live action show of "Dirilis: Ertuğrul," featuring horses, actors in Ottomanstyle costumes, and a swordfight, led by the famous Turkish actor Gunkut. We explored the Sultan's camp, complete with authentic artifacts. Our journey continued to the opulent Dolmabahce Palace on the European side, followed by a visit to the Museum of History of Science and Technology in Islam, which showcased Muslim inventions from the golden age. We prayed Zohr at the magnificent Hagia Sophia, an architectural marvel echoing with the call to prayer, and visited Topkapi Palace before enjoying a traditional Turkish lunch. In the evening, we marveled at the beauty of Sultanhamet Cami, also known as the Blue Mosque.



DAY 4



Oday, we travelled from Maltepe to Sultanahmet via the underground tube, and the journey was quick and amazing. Upon reaching Sultanahmet, we visited the Basilica Cistern, constructed by the Eastern Roman Empire's Justinian I in 542 A.D. to supply water to the Great Palace. Following a visit to the Nurousmaniye Mosque for Zohr prayer, we headed to the Grand Bazaar with Turkish partners for shopping.

The day concluded with us being invited to a meal at the Turkish partners' families, this gave us an opportunity to experience genuine Turkish culture, home-cooked food, and daily life

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DAY 5

Something different today, we explored Miniaturk. Imagine seeing all the famous landmarks, monuments, buildings of Turkey located in one place. Yes, that's Miniaturk a wonderful openair museum that displays tiny versions of turkey's most famous attractions and architectural structures. it's also known as the miniature turkey museum.


Our day continued with a visit to the Eyup Sultan Mosque, constructed in 1458 outside the city walls after the Ottoman conquest of Constantinople. We also visited the grave of Sahabi Abu Ayyub al-Ansari, a companion of Prophet Muhammad.

The day concluded with a moving Mawlaw Ceremony at Mawlaw House, showcasing the Whirling Dervishes. Originating from Konya, this mystical ceremony represents a spiritual journey for a closer connection with God, highlighted by the dervishes' profound dedication.





DAY 6



ur host facilitated a meeting with the Istanbul Planning Agency to discuss Turkey's comprehensive "Vision 2050" for the future of Istanbul. The Vision 2050 Office aims to address the city's priorities, objectives, and potential problems, with a focus on achieving sustainable development.

Following the meeting, we explored Taksim Square, the modern heart of Istanbul known for cultural activities and commerce. The vibrant area, surrounded by historic landmarks like the Ataturk Cultural Center and the Monument of the Republic, is a popular tourist destination. We enjoyed shopping on Istiklal Street, a bustling pedestrian avenue filled with shops, restaurants, and street shows. Some of us ventured to see the Galata Tower, a historic structure from 1348, renowned for its various uses over the centuries and its association with Hezarfen Ahmet Celebi's 1638 flight, considered the world's first intercontinental flight. Unfortunately, access to the tower was closed due to renovations.

DAY 7

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Following this breathtaking experience, we crossed the 15th July Bridge for a Bosphorus cruise, enjoying views of Maiden's Tower. The week concluded with a visit to Camlica Mosque and museum, where relics and belongings of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) and artifacts from the Kaaba are displayed. Inaugurated in 2019, the mosque, designed by female architects Bahar Mızrak and Hayriye Gül Totu, can accommodate 63,000 people and features various facilities.

Back at the Orhangazi dormitory we were greeted by parents who wished us all farewells and awarded medals to all the students as a token of remembrance.
